There was three of them and they send him off to another place. Kind different Company.

(Company E?)

Yeah, then we was one, "Company E," call it. Company E. Fourth--304 Cavalry.

But they artillery, then when we-- Heavy artillery.

(Heavy Artillery? Where did you go?)

We stayed there one month. After discharge. Before we get discharge. I got a discharge 27 day in December. Didn't let me off till 1st. Come in the 1st--General.

(That was after the Armistice was signed in November?)

Yeah. I got pay--give you a dollar a day at that time.

(Dollar a day.)

(Where were you?)

Dollar a day. And insured--insure, seven dollars, washings, (not clear) two and a half. (not clear) washing, dollar and canteen ticket, three dollars. Then I pay insurance was seven dollars--insurance--life insurance. I didn't have much left for my thirty dollars. (laughter)

Huh?

(Where was your Company? Did you go to Germany?)

We didn't go. They let them hold us back. Too much expense, (not clear) -gonna go, you know. Governor said, hold it back (not clear). Germany was
signing. Peace, you know. They did sign it. Eleven day and eleven minutes -something like that. They signed it. Kaiser was President. Yeah.

(So you didn't get to go overseas.)

They wouldn't let us go. That's too many expense.

(Where did you stay in the United States?)

We was down there Cleo Springs, (?) Texas. Camp Stanfoind. (?)
