It was there. (I bet the depot?) Yeah the depot, ole depot it's still there. (Did you ever ride, on a train?) Yeah, I did. I went to McAlester and came back. I think it was the greatest thing I done. I went to Kansas City one time with my Aunt

Mary. She was awful sick, you know, and Bill Dandridge was there.
