Indians out there, those other tribes. Because they killed a lot of us and we killed a lot of them. And sometimes he said, "They run us. They chase us, just chase us plenty back clear home. Somedays we go over there and we clean them up. They were a big race, them Utes was, but we killed them, we killed them so bad that they are a small race of people now."

And that's what they are today, just a small race of them. Because the Kiowa, Kiowa-Apaches had to raide their homes and kill them off.

(Why did they fight with the Navajos/)

They fought with the Navajos with bows and arrows.

(Why did they fight the Navajo?)

They are enemies. They weren't no friends. They're enemy, just like the Chinese today. They fighting over there in Viet Nam over there. They fighting among their own people. See, their own nation, their own tribe. Same language, same life they live, but they fighting among theirselves. Well, that's the way it was way back there before this country was open. The Indians were wild. Wasn't no white people here. There wasn't one white people here. When they get out and on the war path, then finally way later years after then they soldiers come in and they—the Kiowas and Kiowas Apache fought the soldiers.

(How did the Apaches get hooked up with the Kioyas?)

They originate with them every since that they originate of the Kiowas and Apaches have been all together all the time. They all roam together. They all become one together. Stayed together, they move around together, they fought together, they go hunting together. They just travel there. Them all two tribes, they all together even since that the Indians were there. And then later part, well then the Comanches they came out of Old Mexico. They came into the soutwestern edge of Texas. They come there and originate there.

(Did the Kiowas and Comanches used to fight?)

They fought together. They fought one another. Yeah, they're run those
