She (not clear) my mother's brother. Him and them two they had it.

(What was your uncle's name?)

Wayne, Wayne Whitewolf. ^

(And that's your mother's family, Whitewolf?)

Yes, Whitewolf.

(And where did they all come from?)

I don't know--oh they come from--they--my grandmother she come from Denver.

'Cause she was Arapaho, her father was-they lived up there. Way back in years they lived in Colorado Springs--where they lived. That's where my grandfather was killed. Fight--was killed by the white people.

(Killed by the white.)

Uh-huh killed by the white people.

(What happened? How did that happen?)

They had--I don't know what they owned. They tried to drive them away from that place where they live. And he was chief of the Arapahoes. And he got killed right there. Then, when my grandfather still lived there he took my grandfather--after my grandfather died--my great grandfather died--he was a chief and his name was--my grandmother's father was--see what was--oh, I can't think of it. (Pause)

## SOME PEOPLE NEVER PAY - INCIDENTS

(One thing I want to ask you about what kind of -- time I was talking to you, you said that some people don't pay. How would that be?)

It is, you know. Some people they don't pay. They should—they have to pay but, they say, "Well, we haven't got it now. Tomorrow," they say, "We'll come when we get money, we'll pay you. We get you that real soft material and give it to you." They don't do it. And that's why she was talking about some people that came here. I was in there listening to them. Lots of people come here and they come in sick, real sick and she take her
