(Then what do they do?)

They start dancing.

(How do they dance that? What kind of a step do they do?)

Evelyn: It's something like the Forty-Nine, isn't it?

Alfred: It's a step just like a Forty-Nine (A kind of round dance).

(Well, where do they put the brush?)

Alfred: They drag it.

Evelyn: Well, when they get to the arena, they just dispose of it.

They just start dancing.

(Does each person drag some brush?)

Evelyn: Yeah, if you want to. And if you don't want to, you don't have to.

Alfred: You know how these singers—they're sitting. But these singers be around that drum, you know. Well, they march forward. They don't turn—they just march. Them gays that are on that side—(other side of the drum) have to go backwards.

(Are they walking?)

They just walk with that drum, yeah.

Evelyn: Yeah, they're standing up and holding it (the drum):

Alfred: And they drag that brush right behind them. And them womens are right behind the singers. They dance, you know. Just like--you see these women dance, you know.

(Have you ever seen it?)

Evelyn: I seen them when I was real small.

(Why don't they do it anymore?)

I, don't know. They, got songs. They got songs for that, but I think it's

gone.
