quite understand that - they played the fiddle and how did they line up? Now you were telling me how they lined up for this Cherokee dance that they did. The fiddlin' dance.)

Side II

Unhunnh. Fiddlin' dance. Cherokee. Yeah.

(Would you tell me again how they lined up and what they did?) Yeah. Just lined up, you know, and make a square, I mean a round , you know. 'ust like you know square dance you know. When they started to go and dance they all in circle aint it. That's what they doin'. Man and woman each side, this side of woman, men all lined up. They don't mix. When they started they pat you know and they goin' dance - jig - right there, woman right there. That's when they started. They started they pat you know, they jig - Jigger dance.

(Jig?)

They got is way and jig, jig, jig. When they done and we watch them half - and woman on this side, and next time they will make a circle again and then right there and second man and woman stand there and get start again. They go up like this - then do like that. When they finish all of them, they quit. They're done.

(You said something about two sticks on fiddle.)

Yeah.

(How would they do that?)

You know the fiddle like -

(With a bow?)

Unhunnh. Like this you know. They hit right there.

(Right on the string?)

Yeah. Unhunnh. I mean right there where the string.

(Hunnh.) (Just two sticks to keep time with the jigging?)
