BACKGROUND OF INFORMANT:

Charles Tartsah is a moderately acculturated Kiowa, though he is enrolled as a Kiowa-Apache, his father's tribe. Charles is around 65 years old. Charles was raised around his mother's parents. His mother's father was Old Man Pallie, a Spanish boy captured by the Comanches and later traded to the Kiowas. His mother's mother was Kiowa, and told him the story here related. Charles attended the St. Patrick's Mission School, just west of Anadarko.

(This interview took place in the work shed right next to Charlie Palmer's Hog Creek Curio Store, about 7 or 8 miles west of Anadarko, next to the Hog Creek Bridge. Charlie Palmer and Charles Tartsoh are half-brothers having the same mother. 'incoln Tartsoh, Charles' son, is present, and occasionally takes part in the interview. His comments are enclosed in parentheses with his name. 'Charles Palmer and Abel Bigbow were also present at times, and occasionally comment something in Kiowa.)
