Yeah, I guess you've seen it. I have it here somewhere. Big Joe--this fella, he's a policeman. This is a policeman. He's a Comanche.

(What's his name?)

Let's see. What's his name? I forgot. His name might be on the back. No, I'm not acquainted too well with those Comanches. Oh, I don't know what I done with it. I had it this morning though. I wanted to show it to you. Well, anyway they keep order. They keep order around the Agency, and among the tribes. I told you about my grandfather being the judge. And they have court. Murder. Adultery. Sometimes another Indian run off with another man's wife or somebody beat up his wife. And these policemen go get him and bring him in. Yes. They know no whiskey is allowed
