in what particular tribe. However, like in this Athabascan speaking peoples, it could have been the Mescaleros. It could have been Lipans. It could have been those—I just wonder if those Barefoot Indians could speak our language, the Athabascan language. See, those—there's about four or five in that southwest area—speaks Athabascan. Therefore I couldn't say specifically as to what particular tribe sing these, songs. I imagine they're lipan.

(Are you talking about peyote songs?)

Yes. And how they got it, that's another thing I'd like to learn.

There's just a lot of things that I want to know, myself.

(What's this other group that he mentioned--the Kordosos?)

Well, that's-- Would that be in the Anthropology department? That particular tribe?

(I don't think I've 'ever heard of it.)

Well, maybe James Mooney had, though.

(That's why I was wondering if you had ever heard about it.)

I couldn't comment on that--

(I was wondering where Tennison Berry got it?)

He probably got it from Mooney.

(You think so?)

Well, that's the only way, or else he made it up. Where do you think he got it?

(I don't know. That's what I'd like to find out.)
