It begin when--the world-- They say there was nothing but water here. Used to be nothing but water here. That's when that story begins.

(Is it a very long story?)

Yeah, it's a long story.

(Do you know the whole thing?)

Well some of them. Biggest part of them, I know.

(I won't have you tell it now then, I'll just wait and maybe I'll get it next time.)

Yeah, that's a good story. It's a story something like when the Christ was born.

(It is?)

Well, it's pretty much same. We got a boy that that's what we call him. We call him d<sub>w</sub>'kitali-- That's some kind of boy. It's not no--not like we are-- it's different. But he was a--just like we are--

(What was that name?)

d<sub>w</sub>'kitali . Kind of a god. Boy or God. And it's still with us here today-- those two bundles. One at Hobart and one at Carnegie . Dzaidetali. They say (?) is one of them bundles.
