That's my tribute to the chief that I was very close to because he was related to my father. They're the ones that set this pattern for this country to be opened. And I know that they were meant for all that would be the benefit for the future that we still have those--enjoy those privileges. Thank you. (Applause)

((Thank you very much Mr. Rowledge. And now we'll have an Arapaho song by the some of our local Arapaho Indians. (Sings) (Applause)

This program has been planned to be very simple, and it has been simple, anything else would have been certainly contrary to the people we are honoring. This land has been given, rather deeded to the city of Geary and the city in turn has deeded it to the state Historical Society and we are in hopes and I know it will be accomplished that this sight will become one of the great historical signs in the nation. And we want to thank all the people that participated and have made this centennial vespers and the success it has to become and the place to be developed the way it has been developed, because most anybody who came here prior to last spring, I believe, it was difficult, almost a hardship to get to the location. And as I said, we hope that the state Historical Society has title to this land, that it will be developed into one of the great shrines of this country. Because it certainly is fitting for it. In closing we'll ask Al Story of the Assembly of God Church in Geary to give the Benediction.
