HOWARD TELLS OF HIS EARLY LIFE AND TRAINING BY GRANDMOTHER  
GRANDMOTHER'S PHILOSOPHY  
FINISHED 9TH GRADE IN PUBLIC SCHOOL  
DROPPED OUT OF SCHOOL WHEN HE WAS 16 - ENLISTED IN U.S. ARMY  
BEGINNING HIS LIFE IN THE ARMY  
MORE ABOUT GRANDMOTHER'S TRAINING AND PHILOSOPHY  
DEVELOPED GOALS AND A PHILOSOPHY FOR HIMSELF  
LIFE OUT OF THE ARMY - MORE PHILOSOPHY  
CLINTON YOUNGBEAR - CHILDHOOD  
ENTERS CONCHO SCHOOL  
HAS MADE ADJUSTMENT NEEDED TO MIX WITH WHITE PEOPLE

BACKGROUND OF INFORMANTS:

Howard Goodbear was born in 1928. He was raised by his grandmother from a very small child and has followed her philosophy and principals throughout his life. He graduated from high school after he was retired from army service. Howard dropped out of Watonga school in the 9th grade and joined the army and spent 20 years there. He is a scout-master, active in community life and serves on the Cheyenne-Arapaho Council.

Clinton Youngbear is 38 years of age. He was born and reared in Concho, but moved to Watonga several years ago. He attended Concho school, but learned to do body and fender work at a vocational school. Clinton is also active in community life and tribal affairs and a member of the Cheyenne-Arapaho Council.
