INDIAN ALLOTMENTS AND PAYMENTS:

We call 'em, Indian Department, you know. The white people just got a little, little money, maybe per capita payment, you know what that thing that that little \$35 are, per capita payment, \$10 capita payment and so on. And that's how come that land where that where the rest of them got it all. That's when they sold it, you know. That's where--that's where it goes too. And now last time that's when \$300 a piece. That's when coal all under the ground in here.

(Coal and asphalt, wudn't it?)

Yeah, that's what. What Jimmy got in there.

(Yeah. That's right. You sure are right.)

That's when we got that \$300 apiece.

(That group of 1800 that you came with or came about that time. Was that had there been a group of 'em before that time?)

Before (nin) that time.

(And then some more came later.)

Yes, yes, just you, you know, they's say this one here he done come in that way back up yonder down before this one. His daddy and grandpa is all in there.

See that. That's what we was talking about Sunda is that history on that thing in there. He said, see that Mississippi State there, New York State belong to Indians first. When the white people found the Indian in there, wee we's preachin' in there. What's the Indian come from in here thishere when white people founded this United States here. That's what we was preachin' over there's you know. See white people found this Indian first on this. And now where we preachin' here in the scripture. All in there. But we Indians we don't know which
