**T-218-2** Uh-huh. It is, they're more Chickashas out around us than Choctaws. Yeah uh-huh. Yeah, part of my land, down There close to Caddo, on that flatland. Sold it, you know, such a good lprice, you know. Run it through. (Were were--where was your mother and dad's land?) My mother she filed over here about three miles east of here on this old highway. About half way between--on this old road. When my mother died. All divided 1 p and all done sold off. One man owns it just now. IUm-hum. That's a good breeze. About nap time. You take a nap? You sleep?) Uhohuh. I don't . Sometimes I do. When I get tired or somethin like that. I lie down and take a little nap. Hardly ever. POP: I never do in the day time. Course, I don't do much but I just piddlin' around little by little all the time. Yeah. **CHOCTAW WORDS:** Yeah, I make waterhole in there for my ducks. And I got a little waterhole over there for my hogs. And keep me busy waterin' them. And make 'em waller in place. (POP: What is ducks in 'Choctaw?) Huh? POP: What is duck in Choctaw? Ducks? POP: Yeah. Okfochush. POP: Okfochush. I know what (ujin) (What's goat? Goat?) Huh? (Goat.) Okfochush. POP: Chikfikosoma is goat. (Could you hear him?) Huh-hu. (Say it again, goat.)

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
