(Mr. McIntosh, at the age of 10 where did your mother trade; where did she buy things; was there a store in Seminole county?)

Wewoka Trading Co., run by--Jackson Brown and them owned the store. You know, where the ice plant is?

(Yes sir)

That's where the store was then.

(Across the track?)

Yes sir, across the track.

(Now there wasn't any railroad track at that time--no railroad here?)

No, no, no.

(Do you remember much about the store, who worked there?)

Yes sir, I remember that, you know, Jackson Brown--the store was his and your dad worked in the store there, Houston Miller, and you had an uncle by the name of Louis Miller, and--let see who else clerked in the store there. I remember them two, good.

(Did any of the Walker brothers work there at that time?)
