Yes suh, in both of the settlements; in all of the settlements, far as that go.

(There were three principal settlements through --)

Yes suh.

(-Little River, and place out north of Knoawa, and Mobletown?)

Nobletown and ah, Turkey Creek.

(Where's Turkey Creek?)

Tha's back out west there, yes suh, north of Seminoles.

(0h uh huh.)

Tha's right.

(Now, do you remember anything in history--there's a story about ah, ah, a colored man who came out from Florida with the Seminoles, a man bl the name of Gopher John. Do you remember any stories about him, that you've heard?)

No suh, U sure don't--I had a cousin that had a book concerning that name, but I wouldn't know what became of it.fI didn't know that til, I'll say, late years.

(Do you know of any of his descendents who are living in Seminole county now?)

No suh, I sha don't.
