Oh, it has a place in there, it's dust. You haven't seen inside of that?
(No, I'd like to.)

Well you can go pep in my house.

(Thank you, I'd love to see it.)

You can peep in there and you can see the fireplace. I ain't got no fire in there.

(Do you still cook much on the open fire?)

Oh yes, yesterday I cooked bread outside, yesterday evening. I still like to cook in the open fire. It tastes different from this here. My grandkids, they like my bread, what I cook out there.

(Is it yeast bread?)

No, just flour like you was gonna make biscuits. But it tastes different on open fire.

(Tell me a little more about how you make this house. You said you put the cat-tails together -- who puts the poles up?)

Oh well, my husband does that but he's gone now. I don't know who--maybe just get somebody--maybe my nephew, here.

(What kind of poles do you use?)

Willows. Trees.

(Are there any cat-tails around here to get?)

You just have to go look for cat-tails. Just have to look for 'em. There used to be lots of 'em but new they ain't much.

(What do you get 'em in?)

Right now you get 'em in a pond. West of Oklahoma City where the dam is, most of 'em goes there. That's far. Way out there.

(Go in a pick-up or something?)

Uh-huh. People goes over there and cut them.

(You were saying that sometimes the water's sort of deep.)
