The old man tells him how to make it and copy it, and how the pictures are made. And we boys were around there. Anybody could come around and look around and go inside. But you don't touch them--you just can look around. When he was making this book, and that's when I'saw it. (Well, did you see the big, full-sized Tipi like that?) Yeah, full-sized. It's Yellow Wolf's tipi.) Was Yellow Wolf Aiving at that time?) He was a warrior and a old Indian. He never was civilized. (Was he still living at the time Mooney was there? Yeah. He died just about 15 or 20 years ago. Yeah, he lived to age. And old man. They have a picture of him, his folks have. And the interesting part of that old man--he got converted into Christian religion. He was a wild savage, and he composed a song. And it's a beautiful song--in Indian. And the words are good words, too. It was really his prayer, and then he composed it into a song. He sang it. And lot of Indian churches sing that song tod ay. It says, "My people, don't give up. Dont' stop worshipping God. Keep on worshipping. Worship Him. Worship Him only." And he repeated that about two or three times. Maybe we can get Hazel to sing it when she comes. (When did you get this, book?)
