(What about this other story--about the girl that married the dog--does that have a name?)

"Dog-Boy." They call him the "dog-boy."
(How do you say that?)

I think it has a different name. I think you call it "The Chief's Daughter." "The Chief's Daughter that Married a Young Man." I think that was the name of the story. They don't say "dog." "Chief's Daughter that married a young man." That's the beginning of the story.

(You were saying that your grandmothers would tell you these stories. Well, did you ever ask your grandmother to tell you a particular story? I mean, would she just tell anything she wanted to, or would children ever ask their grandmothers to tell something?)

No. You don't never ask them because you don't know what to ask.

They just come out and tell you, themselves.

(I was wondering if you would ever say, "Grandmother, tell me about the seven brothers that had a sister--")

Well, see, in the first place, I wouldn't know the seven brothers story. I never did hear it before. Well, maybe she'll tell it to me one time and maybe the next time I went to visit her I would say, "Grandmother, tell me that story again." See? Because if I heard about it and it was interesting, the second time I knew I'd aske her. That's the way it is.
