Well, I think I got a little bit here --(goes and gets sample of sage and cedar that he's used)--here's sage, and here's cedar. You keep that in a room and burn it--the spooks won't bother you. White people don't believe in that but it's (unintelligible)

(Where do you get this?)

In the mountains.

(Here?)

Oh, just about three miles from here in those limestone hills (on north side of Wichita Mtns.) They got red berries. There's different kinds of cedar. You see them red berries? Most got blue berries. These grow in the lime hills and it's got red berries.

(What's the name for this in Kiowa?)

W. hi We mix that up and put that in the fire. Put that mixed up with that--

(Mix the sage with this?)

Yeah, and lot of this peyote Native Church of American? They use this ~~sage~~ sage in the smoke. They put smoke. It originally comes from Nevada
