BACKGROUND OF INFORMANT: Conna May Saddleblanket was born in 1888 and thus remembers life in the latter part of the reservation period. She started to school in 1901 but did not attend very long. Kiowa-Apache is her first language, and still the one she is most at home with, but her English is fairly good. Conna May is also known as Datose. She was married to Homer Saddleblanket. She now lives in Hobart with a granddaughter, Mrs. Virgil Wolf. Conna May died in December, 1968. She was one tho assisted in revival of the Manatidie by teaching some of the songs to the new generation of Kiowa-Apaches.

PRELIMINARY CONVERSATION

(What I'd really thought about asking you is if you could tell me some stories about the way it was here before they allotted the land. Do you remember when you were born?)

1888.

(You probably remember something of the way it was before they allotted the land.)

Yeah. This way, when I got to maybe about fourteen years old, I remember some things.

(And I thought you could try to think of some things that happened back in those lays. Maybe you could tell some stories about what life was like then, before they ellotted the land. There might be some cowboys, or cattle grazing, or rations or things like that you could tell about.)

Oh yes, there's ration, and they give cattle out, and--

(Wait just a minute. Let me check the tape--)
