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Jenny: Yeah, that's his mother. He's married.

Cecil: Yeah, that's right. That's right. I've got his picture here. I just wonder what they...

Jenny: I told you he was so forgetful. (How did you get acquainted with the Mescaleros?) Cecil: 1909, '10, '11, '12. This boy, Houston Peck, his brother went to Chilocco school.

Jenny: That was '08; '09, and '10.

Cecil: Yeah. Well, he went to school there at that time and I got acquainted with his brother, David Keen is his name. So that's how I got acquainted with him and he stayed with us about three 'Vars after he vacation.' Of course when he came home to stay at my home, and we run around together. That's how I got acquainted with him.

Jenny: This boy went and stayed with him at his home and they kept him there pretty near all year around.

(Well now, this other fellow you were talking about, this Asegonoh, was he here in Oklahoma by the time you went to Chilocco school?) Cecil: (speaks Kiowa) Oh, yes. Yes, he was here. Asegonoh, he's apache. He's also Apache.

Jenny: He's an older man.

Cecil: But I went to Summerville, he's peyote leader, that's how come I know him. He was here when I'left to go to school. He was an old man then. Yes, he was way up in, maybe over 70.

(Where did he live?)

Cecil: He live where they used to ride, north of Indiahoma. Where they used to call it Post Oak Mission. That's where he live, Post Oak Mission. Two room house, I'd say.
