(Well did they have many bad men in those early days running around?)

Gib: Well they did, but I never did, I never did ---

Mrs. Fallin: Well, that is something is history to us.

Yeah, it is history to us we never did remember only tellin to us, you know.

Man: Well, we grew up in a mean settlement I tell you. Yeah, one time a fellow come to our house on a horse and he tried to ride that one into our home.

(Is that right)

Said, "Open the door, I'm gonna ride my horse in your home." But he didn't do it. He was one of, well everbody was afraid of him anyway.

Gibb: I can't remember. Always fightin some amongst theirselves y'know.

George Squirrel and John Downing y'know, George killed John and then --

Mrs. Fallin: Somebody was killed up at Aunt Liza's y'know.

Gibb: Well, they was up there at the Beasley place you know --

Mrs. Fallin: Well that's Aunt Liza's home.

Gibb: Bert Doublehead killed Frank Skeen.

Mrs Fallin: Yeah, Left bullet holes --

Yeah. Them bullet holes in that wall where he shot him.

Mrs. Fallin: And on that old floor. We never could get the blood stains Gib: off that floor. Yeah, that was just a drunken fight. And after Bert shot him, that sobered Bert up and they said he done ever thing he could for 'im but he died. Bert went to the penetentiary. And after he served his time, well, he come back here but he'd contacted that TB down there ---

Gibb: Now, that was --
