It's the same thing. They old, you know. Now here, see, now here. See, you can cut it. See, I'll straighten it. Jenny will bawl me out. That's her father's. That thing, I don't know how old it is. But you saw them--you've got one of mine, new one. And that's the only thing they had to suck that blood out--that's all.

(Well, do they, when they're going to use the eagle wing bone for this, do they have to boil it or anything?)

No. Sometimes they make it soft and they cut it. They cut it, you know, just like they cut it here and here. And then they just scrape a little bit like I did and make it. They make it come out even. See, this is a string. They use sinew. Did I give you some of that sinew?

(I don't think so. Well, I think I've got some.)

There's your sinew.

(Oh, yes!)

I get a dollar and a half apiece for them.

(What is that?)

Them things, you couldn't break them. That's the hardest thing. It grows right in the back of a cow--right in the back. And they make arrows and make their, their bow strings. And they make anything that you couldn't break. They make it out of this. And you have to know how to make it. I get a dollar and a half for that from Mrs. Robinson.

PIPES MADE OF DEER LEG BONE

(Let me show you these--these pipes.)

That's of deer, deer bone. It's right off of right in here.

(Off the hind legs?)

Hind or front, can be either.
