Well now let's see, them Ward's and uh-Bill Mayes. Bill Mayes used to live in Grove. Had a big hotel there.

(Yeah.)

Course he's been deada long time. My wife's (words not clear) lived there she's dead. And then there's Hampton, Bert Hampton, he's an old timer. He's a white fellow though. He married into an Indian family. And Uh--Cox's, George Cox and Grover out there:

(Uh-huh)

And uh--now let's see--I'm just studying--Harland, Ace Harland lived up, still lived further up Eldon Branch they called it. Some old school house back up in there.

(Un-fruh)

Richard Fields, he's my second cousin. And Uncle Bud, Bud Fields, the only uncle I had. He's still lives back up--back up south of Dodge. They've got a cemetery there. Uncle Bud has.

(Well.)

Him and his family. And he's got-(And he's still living.)

No, no he's been dead quite awhile.

(That was his home, \though.)

Yeah, that was his home. He raised a family there. There was Richard, Wesley and Pete and about three girls.

(Uh-huh) .

And these Frenches down here. William French married one of the girls.
