Tom had. I think he knows what he had and how to get to them.

(Uh-huh)

He still, did live in Jay. His wife, I guess, lives there yet. And they are relations of mine.

(Uh-huh)

Old, Same P. he was Stand Watie's son. I had a fine visit with him one time. He was in the hospital in Grove. (static on tape--sentence not clear). Stand Watie used to have. Somebody give him a note, you know.

(Yeah.)

And he paid it off you know. (more static) Stand Watie (words not clear).

(That was awfully good historical stuff.)

It sure was.

(Words not clear)

If you ever see Sam Fields there, he county clerk there at Jay, you know.

He's crippled now, you know.

`(Yes.)

He just tell you anything about Stand and about his home. If he has any papers or anything (words not clear). (static). But that day and time they didn't have much money but they had a good living. It didn't take much money. Didn't have no money. And I did know a fellow lived over there, right across that Whitewater bridge, you know. Jim Bucket's his name. (static) Went to Grove he had thirty-five thousand dollars.

(Well.)

And he never would put it in the bank. But the court got into it. Dr. Walker told, Dr. Walker was in the banking business. He said, "You know Dave Tucker come in this morning and deposited thirty thousand dollars." And he just lived in the woods over there. And raised a family over there.
