He believes that the winters were much more severe when he was a little boy. And remembers his mother telling him on his first birthday snow was four feet deep in Spring Creek hollow, and could only see horse's head above snow. In that snow storm of winter of 1886 deer could almost be caught with hands. He has observed the change in weather condition thru the years.

He remembers when Indians used to visit one another, especially when someone was sick. They would build a fire out in the yard and sit around all night.

He speaks of the wickedness in the world, and talks of his life philosophy.

He remembers in his very early days when Indians made salt at the salt springs at Salina.

He mentions the Wickliff boys and their father, and knew them. Says they were good people, but whiteman made them into outlaws.
