living on is what I don't know, but it was my mother's land, or whether it was my sister's land or my brother's land. See them two that died with measles.

(What happened to their land after they died?)

Well they sold it. My dad must have sold it. He was the heir to them, them days you could sell them, you know, without permission. If I was leaving he wouldn't give me no permission, see. He would sell it. That's when my sister used to get mad. "Why didn't you save Mary a piece of land?" see, she meant me.

(Now which sister is that?)

That's my sister Emily--the oldest one. She had land.

(Well, now, is she the one that died and he sold her land?),

No, my other sister. I don't know them. They were before me.

(You mean, your brother that died were...?)

Yeah, they were before me.

(Now is Emily older than you also?)

Yes, she was older than all of us. Even the two dead ones.

(Then she got land too?)

She got land and them two got land and my mother got land and my father got land, but my sister's married so she had her own land. She got land and her husband got land. But me, I didn't get any because I was born too late. So that's 1894, '--93', '94'--now how old would I be?

(You'd be--)

Seventy-four?

(You'd be 74 if you were born in 1893.)

That's what I thought.

(Now did you have any other brothers and sisters after you were born?)
