(Son: There was a long time before Stilwell was over there.)
(Well, I guess it was.)

Well, I remember when there was no Stilwell over there.

-(Well.)

(Son: Mother and the girls (not clear). When I was small we lived at little Evansville Creek out of Arkansas.

(Yes.)

Up there. Between where Stilwell is and Evansville. And the only place to go to mill was at Evansville. Or, over back towards. Tahlequah over there. But that was too far. Father never did go. He always went to Evansville
