(You had to go quite a ways to get wood though, didn't they?)
(Third man) Yeah, down to the river.

(That was a big chore too.)

Oh, yes. Its quite a job to get wood.

(Fourth man) Back in there towards Hominy Falls used to be plenty wood.

(Fourth man) Lay right on back of Hominy Falls over there and I been over there and boy there's some old graves over there. I don't remember who all is there.

(Does that cemetery have a name?)

No, I don't suppose it does.

(Well, I want to find out about that.)

But now I imagine old Yeager Parks, Yeager could tell you about it.

(All right 'I'll find out about that.)

(Static on tape)

(Fourth man) West of Skiatook and a mile south and then go back another mile west and the road kinda turns off and goes off winding--one of 'em goes around this way and winds back to the road and the other one winds around back down towards Hominy Falls. Go back down south and just before you across the creek, down there just before you go--well, when you come off the bridge it lays right down in the creek, you can see, right on the bank of the creek.

(What did they have in the way of old cemeteries when you folks first came here around in this area?)
