See, little Aggie was up there, and Joe was in town, and Matilda-oh, there's eight or nine of them there. Probably wanted to get their lease money on the January lease money due. So Agnes must not have had enough money.

Bob: She told us she spent six thousand dollars last--I don't doubt it because she drew her two thousand twenty-three hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$2,325.00) just like that--and they did make a good lease or two--on their mineral (?) lands--

Jess: She said that there's one lease that they want to draw--that's six hundred dollars a year. So fourteen of them--some of them--secondary heirs:-wouldn't get much.
