They went and they-- now his son--now this one out here at Rose, a mile east of Rose, and there's quite a few Indians buried there. Now this Hummingbird, old man Hummingbird, family all but himself is buried there. And one of them is Jess Hummingbird--

(I knew him, I think.)

He's the only one that's got a stone, and they had a brother named Swinner, his mother and Maggie, his sister, were all buried down there. There's lots of Indians buried out there. (Sentence not clear.)

(This is an old country through here.)

Yes, it is an old country.
