BACKGROUND OF INFORMANT:

May Hilderbrand Casto is 81 years old. She was born and raised in the Whiteoak Community in what is now Craig County, Oklahoma. She and her husband, Frank, live on the land originally settled by their parents and grandparents. May's father was Reverend Benjamen Hilderbrand and her mother was Mary Fallin. Both were full blood Cherokees.
