groceries, hardware and different things. It's a long commissary building. That's where the Indians get their rations.

Well, we had this sawmill. The road runs this way from Dudley Brown's store, right here, first one. That's where Dudley Brown's store is. First one. And just a little ways over here is Cleveland—Cleveland store, and the Robert Boak. No Robert Boak—These both were two story buildings, either one of them two story building and there was—later on there was another one. There was an' Indian church here. This was a church.

(What church was it?)

Mepon. Mepon. Remember that man who wrote that book I showed you. Then next to the church was another story, another trading store. Craig. Mr. Craig's store and way west of there, close to the crossing. People come in there to cross the river, was another big store. That's Frank Fred. Frank Fred. Called him Seinpauzeidlbei. "Terrible Beard" store. Seinpauzeidlbei (terrible beard). And they got name for all those stores. They call Dudley Brown's store, Doc Brown. Then they call Charlie Cleveland's "Chawley"— They don't say Charlie, they say "Chawley." And Boak they just call him Boak. Well, the Agency afterwards moved, way over here, where it was abolished, before the country opened and the Agency was way over here.

(Let's see. This was the saw mill?)

Yeah, next to the river.

(And this was 'the Agency?)

Yeah, that's the agency.

(This is the suspension bridge?)

The Agency was a two story building too. It's sort of square.
