It's an Oklahoma song, but I can't--maybe it's Ponca.

That's Caddo. Them Caddoes, they use a lot of that "e-nay-ha-way."

They use lot of that. Caddoes.

That's Caddo. A Caddo song.

(Next song, Number 31, played. Shirley Eagle Hawk sings.)

That's a Caddo song, that Williams--Francis Williams--used to sing that.

That's Caddo too. I've heard that myself. I never did sing it,

no. I've heard that in a meeting.

That's Caddo. First two words is Caddo words.
