I think that's awful.

(Yes, that is to let those little old communities disappear that way.) /
When now all they have is homecoming day over there. And my - a friend
of mine invited me to go with her. And they had a big dinner out on the
yard. Just had a nice time. Lots of singing. There was people there clear
from California.

(Do you know anything about that little family cemetery of the Widcliff family up there in Kenwood?)

No I don't know anything about it. (not clear) There was some folks had a daughter lived in Pryor but I don't know what her name was. Why every spring she'd bring two men and come out here. And of course the rocks would be knocked down. They didn't want them to show up in town.

(Yes.)

Didn't want people see them so close to town. That girl would have them men round up them graves. And rake and clean it all off. Straighten up them stones. And it wouldn't be a week before they have them knocked off again. But she don't come anymore. She surely don't live there or else she has passed on.
