Sir:-

I desire to address you and ask that you use your good offices with the President of the United States, to secure the pardon of one Marshal N. Tucker, convicted of murder in the United States Court for the Western District of Arkansas, at Fort Smith, Arkansas, in 1893, Judge Isaac Parker, Deceased, sitting as Judge. Marshal Tucker is now serving a life sentence for this crime.

The facts, briefly stated, are these: Tucker, immediately before the commission of the crime, and while on a drunken spree at South McAlester, Indian Territory, accompanied by one William Wilson, visited a house of ill fame kept by Lula Mayes, in the outskirts of South McAlester. He knocked on the door and requested admittance. Some parley arose between the inmates of the room and Tucker and Wilson on the outside. The voice from the inside seemed to come from the fire-place, some ten feet from the door. Tucker fired his pistol through the door, with the intention only to frighten, thinking no harm could possibly come of it. The woman had arisen and walked to the door and had her hand on the knob when the pistol was fired. This bullet pierced the door and entered the woman's brain, killing her instantly. For this crime Tucker received a life sentence, as before stated.

My impression is that Tucker has received sufficient punishment for the rash and un-premeditated act. He is a good clever, easy-going fellow, and if his pardon could be secured I think the lesson learned through this bitter experience would make him a good man in the future. I hope you will aid us to secure his pardon. His aged father is at death's door, and wants to see his boy again. It remains with you and the President to grant this last appeal.

Dear sir:-

I write you in regard to a claimant as a citizen of the Choctaw Nation, whose name is Mary Kamps. She was notified by the Dawes Commission to appear at Atoka, I. T. between the 10<sup>th</sup> and 13<sup>th</sup> of this month, but owing to the lack of funds she can not make the trip, and also received the notice at the expiration of the above date, which

would make it utterly impossible for her to be there.

Her name before she married was Mary Decker, and she was married to Eli Perry, at what time I can not recollect, Honston M<sup>r</sup>. Curtain was at that time Circuit Judge, and the licenced were issued by him. Eli Perry was unable to pay the judge for the license, which was \$25.00, so his brother Dixon Perry, paid for them, by giving Honston M<sup>r</sup>. Curtain a place, M<sup>r</sup>. Curtain, afterward died, and Dixon Perry took the place back again, still holding the license for his pay.

Many Perry and her husband  
Eli Perry, seperated, and he  
died. They were not divorced at  
the time of his death.

She then married Isaac Kamp,  
and were married by John Loose.  
Dixon Perry claimed that they  
were not lawfully married, as  
he had the licence in his poss-

I received your letter of the 22nd ult some time ago and am glad to learn that you are well. I certainly feel sorry for the condition and misery that you are undergoing, and in writing to you I must be frank as to what I say. Everybody that understands your case is under the impression that you should not have been convicted, and that if you had had a sincere, upright and honorable lawyer it would not have happened. It is simply foolish to turn any further monies over to Wm. M. Cravens, as it is simply throwing it away. I know that I would be perfectly safe in advancing you the amount that you ask for, as your interest here is greater than the amount that you need at this time. My advice to you heretofore has been, and is now, not to have anything further to do with Cravens, but to employ somebody else who will look after your case. You remember what he said when he demanded the \$300.00 of you boys in this case. The money was made up for you and you expected to be turned out on bond, and instead of that an order was procured which sent you to the penitentiary. I believe that Cravens had something to do with delaying the matter of sending you off until he (Cravens) secured this amount through the efforts of your friends. If you boys will agree to leave the matter with me I can employ attorneys that will do faithful work in your behalf, and I believe will eventually secure a pardon for you. Cravens has done so many ticky things that you can not further trust him. A lawyer that will take advantage of a man that is in trouble, and then desert him, is a very poor lawyer indeed. My advice to you is for you to consult your kinfolks and have them agree to employ some good attorney who will give you faithful service, and thereby secure your freedom.
