These adventurers who attempt to take this advantage of the Indians ought to be frustrated somehow. I hope to see you Monday and go over the matter with you.

This office is daily besieged by questions with reference to the allotment of the lands and the division of the land, or rather the setting out of the homestead.

Section 11 of the Supplementary Agreement says:

"For the purpose of making allotments and designating homesteads hereunder, the forty acre quarter subdivision established by the Government survey may be dealt with as if further subdivided into four equal parts, in the usual manner, thus making the smallest legal subdivision ten acres....."

Section 12, of the same Treaty says:

"Each member of said tribes shall, at the time of the selection of his allotment, designate, as a homestead out of said allotment, land equal in value to one hundred and sixty acres of the average allotable land of the Choctaw and Chickasaw Nations, as nearly as may be,....."

In many instances the people are finding it very hard to divide their land so as to get one half of their allotment set out as a homestead, without making smaller divisions of the land than is provided for in the treaty. The question is then will these people be permitted to set aside more or less than one half of their allotment as a homestead--for instance if a person can divide his allotment so as to set aside land equal in value to \$530.00 or \$510.00, but can not divide it so as to set aside \$520.00, will he be permitted to set aside as his homestead either \$510.00 or \$530.00 as he may choose?

Another question, can a person take land, as a homestead

which does not join---for instance will one person be permitted to take ten acres of land in one section, and twenty acres in another section a mile or two from the first, or must all his homestead be together?

You will greatly oblige this office by answering the above inquiries, and if there are any other rules or regulations of the Commission which will touch these or similar points with reference to the description and separation of allotments, would be pleased to have full information.



I am in receipt of your letter of April 20, asking information relative to the designation of homesteads by citizens of the Choctaw and Chickasaw Nations. You state that some citizens are finding it very hard to divide their land so as to get one half of their allotment for homestead, without making smaller divisions of the land than is provided for in the treaty. You further inquire if citizens will be permitted to designate tracts of land which do not adjoin as homesteads or if the homestead selection must be in one tract.

In reply to your letter you are advised that it is not necessary that the land designated for homesteads should be in contiguous tracts, but the land designated as a homestead must be equal in value to one hundred and sixty acres of the average allottable land of the Choctaw and Chickasaw Nations as nearly as may be, in accordance with the provisions of the act of Congress of July 1, 1902.


Your attention is invited to the following rule governing the selection of allotments in the Choctaw and Chickasaw Nations and the designation of homesteads by the citizens of said nations:

G McC 2

"In the determination of a homestead selection, the appraised value thereof shall be as near as practicable to \$520.64, computed from the appraised value of the nearest quarter-quarter-quarter subdivision."



E. Mason, the attending midwife, stated that the child was a male, and that its name was Henry E. Cooper, and a new blank for the purpose of making application, in which the sex of the child should be correctly stated in each affidavit, was enclosed you.

Henry Sanguin the Royalty Collector of this District has been consulting me about the Royalties due the Nation by the Merchants of his District, and I have looked into the matter to some extent, and I find that all of the Merchants have made agreements to fight this tax, and will not pay until compelled to do so, I am looking for Sanguin up on to-days train, but know he will meet with a refusal from all. In regard to the Saw Mill business I am informed that several Mills below Ft-Towson are still sawing and selling Lumber just as fast as possible, I understand that none of the Mills in this part of the Country are running except the one here in town, and they claim that they are only cutting for Citizens who are clearing thier lands, and using the lumber for building purposes, and are receiving money for the swing not taking any part of the timber or Lumber, I do not know that the above is the fact, but that is what they claim. Pardon me for sugesting a means and the only means by which the Lumber selling can be stopped in the lower Country is the taking of all of the lumber into the actual possession by the proper Authorities, and placing it in the hands of a Custodian, or under guard, my idea would be to replevin it, as the property of the Tribe taken without the consent of the Tribe or its authorized Agents or Officers, and I beleive the Courts would sustain the contention of the Nation in its claim of ownership for the use and benefit of the whole Tribe. The above is merely a suggestion of mine, and you might say was unsolicited advice, but I will chance it, and if there is any good in it you can make use of it, if not no harm will be done. "Your friends down here" Latham & Co still claim that Hunter is Gov. but we fail to see any evidence of it. With best wishes I am


