Sir:

Under date of February 18 1904, the Honorable Acting Secretary of the Interior approved my report in the matter of the assessment of damages for right of way of the Fort Smith and Western Railway Company on its line of railway extending from the Arkansas state line westwardly a distance of 18.74 miles.

This proposed line of railway passes through the lands of 19 occupants, ten of whom have accepted the award and nine have dissented therefrom.

With reference to the nine dissenting occupants, it will be necessary to have the compensation to be made them determined by referees. The Commissioner of Indian Affairs directs me to appoint one of the members of this board, the railroad company one, and you one.

I shall be pleased to have you select some competent person to act as one of the referees to assess these damages, and to advise me as to his name and post office address, giving me the full Christian name of the person selected by you.

In reply will say that as this appointment was made at the request of the U.S. Indian Agent, and as his office has already been notified of the appointment of Mr Bower I feel that the proper proceedure would be for your office to take the matter up with the Indian Agent, requesting him to request this office to make another appointment. At the time this appointment was made I had a personal conversation with Mr Bower and he stated that this line did not go through the land of any of his relatives except one sister, and he was of opinion that she would accept the offer of the Railroad, and upon that statement I considered him competent. 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citizens to select these townsite lands as part of their allottment in order for me to provide protection for the people who had bought possessory rights in the various Choctaw towns along our railroad. I went to Mr. George Scott, who was a personal friend, and asked him to select for me a number of reliable Choctaws for the pumposes I have just mentioned. I agreed to purchase all of the occupancy rights and pay all expenses incident to selecting these allottments, and further pay a good price for these lands when allotted. Mr. Scott agreed to select these people for me, and did so; and further than this, he went with me to Atoka and helped these people select their allottments, I paying all the expenses. I make this detailed statement because I see that Mr. Hunter charges that you took these people to Atoka for other purposes, and paid their expenses. In this way I bought from Mr. Julius Powell lands near Bokoshe, as shown by attached letters and statement of Mr. Powell himself.

I sincerely hope that this statement will cause Mr. Huhter to withdraw the unjust and untruthful charges made against you in this connection. Honorable warfare in politics is always to be admired, but resorting to unfair and dishororable methods is a strong indication of weakness.
