rs. R.L. Teylor, & Cherokee Indian, was born in Alabama, near Big Lee's Creek, on June 11, 18:6. Her purents, Benj. F. Paden and Elizabeth (Miller) Paden, both Cherokees, came to the Cherokee Lation, now Adeir County, Oklahoma, when rs. Taylor was only eighteen months old.

The Paden's settled and made a farm near the need of Little Lee's Creek, about three miles postheast of the present town of Stil+ well, Oklahoma. Their reason for settling here was, the good hand and a fine spring of water. Here is where Irs. Taylor spent her childhood, she attended school and Church School and Church at Muddy Spring's, Ewing Chappel and Foney Fill.

In June 1st., 1380, she married Richard L Taylor, a Cherokee. Tray are the parents of five children, four firls and one boy. Frs. Taylor now liver in Stilwell, Oklahoma.

Her husband, Richard L. Taylor, & Cherokee, was born in Flint Fistrict, Cherokee ation, July 31, 1854.

te was a very successful farmer and in his tiddle life he became ' interested in politics, holding several offic s. We was sheriff a number of times and mational Councilman several times. We died August 13, 1934.
