> Interview with C. E. foreland, Lane, Oklahoma.

c. E. Moreland of near Butler School, Lane, Oklahoma, has in his possession one pair of double weight hand scales made with two hooks and two finger rings, with a half-moon circle inside the steel circle. Inside of the moon circle is a half circle made of copper with weight figures from one pound to three hundred pounds on the cast plate that holds the copper plate intact. Date of pattern is invisible.

From all accounts these scales and the stove described were used seventy-five years ago.

He also has in his possession one hand-made and mould stove made from fire clay with light weight iron covering and a slide door. This stove is made in wash-tub shape, 12 inches in height, 12 inches across the top with clay partition, with 14 3/4 inch circle holes for the heat to pass through. The firebox is beneath the partition with slide door for ventilation. This stoys was made to burn coal or charcoal.

There has been a thick cast iron plate to fit on top of stove for cooking purposes and heating flat irons for

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ironing clothes. This stove is so constructed that it can be used for heating tent or room without flue or pipe. The only inscription visible is "Champion-No-3," In fairly good condition. The wall of stove is one inch thick, made of clay.
