INTERVIEW WITH OSCAR JOHNSON LANE, OKLAHOMA.

FIELD WORKER PETE W. COLE.
April 20, 1937

EXPERIENCE OF OSCAR JOHNSON AFTER MOVING TO INDIAN TER-RITORY. AGE 66.

My parents came from the state of Mississippi to Texas where I was born on April 3, 1871. Came to Indian Territory in 1894. We first moved in a wagon to Bryan County and later to Atoka and to Pushmataha County and moved back to Atoka where I have resided and have made this my home.

I did not attend school much in my early days, so my education is very limited,. I have been a dirt farmer all my life. I was married forty one years ago in April.

I have in my possession a dog yoke which was made by my grandfather who died in Texas. It is made of iron. The two pieces about eight inches long are connected with rings, lead ther collar attached to neatly fit around the neck of a blood hound. The purpose is to yoke the two dogs together so they would not get away from each other in running down slaves or convicts at that time. It also can be used in training young doge to hunt. This yoke is over one hundred years old but the correct date is uncertain. It is a hand-made affair having seen made by my grand father.
