I am in receipt of a letter from Brigadier Genl Albert Pike respecting slave hands to be hired to work on the fortification now in progress of erection in this Nation to be called Ft. McCollough. The commanding Genl is quite anxious that the good Citizens of the Choctaw Nation should make every exertion and furnish such help as in their power to carry on the work and complete the same as soon as it can be done. He has called on the people of Texas for assistance, but they have not responded to the patriotic call — they deem it an ill-project, and banesque the commanding Genl without reserve. Some of our own people joins heartily in the banesque. This course of things ought not to be countenanced by reflecting men. I think you wrote me once, that our western frontier was unprotected & that you entertain fears for Boggy Depot & that. too, long before Genl Pike had concluded to erect a fort in our Country. It does seem very strange, that the people of Texas, as well as our own folks, who were murmuring great deal

at the supposed exposure of our western frontier when there was no  
troops here to protect it. Should now turn loose & hurl their clam-  
orous voices against Genl P<sup>r</sup>ke when he is here with his  
Cannon and to protect the very frontier they loudly called  
for before he came in to the country. I hope the good  
citizen of the nation will let reason control their passion  
for once and come boldly & unfeignedly to the assistance of Genl.  
Albert P<sup>r</sup>ke and at once & earnestly that will withstand  
the Rife Canons of Lin colnites for all time to come.

It is my candid opinion that, if the war continues, these same  
clamorous people, will clamour loudest against Genl P<sup>r</sup>ke  
for less than two months, for not having pushed his fortifi-  
cation to completion. The fortification when comple-  
ted will be of immense value to the Western Nation  
as well as to the States of Arkansas and ~~Texas~~  
more so, to the Western & Chickasaws from its being  
established in their midst. It is intended for all  
time to come, at least for all future operation. —  
The Government of the Confederate States has promised  
the Choctaws & Chickasaws protection in her late Treaty  
with them, & she will do what she has promised.  
Genl Albert P<sup>r</sup>ke is here to carry out those promises, ~~and~~  
and is now calling on the Choctaws for laboring  
hands to do that which, he considers to be of the

most important to us! — He wants at least one hundred  
Slave labourers — and about 300 hundred laborers to  
make Intrenchments at Ft. McCollough — he will pay  
them at the rate of One dollar per day for just <sup>Saturday</sup> Hands,  
and make settlement every night or sooner if you wish.

Now Sir what say you to the great undertaking.

How many Hands can you spare? Since there are  
the men hands I have — Brother Hosseil ought to  
spare how many? — I send Garland, Morris, Mc  
Kane, Thos. J. Reilly, Mr. Hartman &c. &c. down  
your section of the County. Capt R. M Jones  
ought at least put in One hundred hands — he  
having at least two hundred working hands.  
I wish you would put your shoulder to the wheel  
~~to~~ to move the patriotic spirits of the Colonists  
for Genl. P. — I told him that I would write  
by you on the subject — that I should have  
taken the trouble of calling on my friends for  
Labouring hands, but I am ordered to proceed  
immediately to Fort Gibon with my Regiment,  
I could not attend to it, when I came back  
I will then see to it.

Your two sons, Leonidas  
& Peter, one a Captain & the other First Lieutenant in the 3<sup>d</sup> Battalion  
Battalion were both well last Wednesday. — They are both

were thought of by his Peers in arms. — I hope  
to see them rise higher in military tactics as  
well as ranks. —

I understand that General and  
Murray are determined to make us as second rate  
& rascals for taking the wagons trains from them  
& for which purpose they have five to Richmond —  
I hope to see them some day. —

Your claim will be paid for furnishing com-  
+ c to the troops if you will present it to the Company  
now under Maj. Jas. Folsom —

We leave next Monday for the Kansas line —  
the Battalion will remain at Head Quarters  
until equipped for duty.
