Chakta Samaha Jan 26th 1842

Dear Col.

Your very esteemed letter of the 2 Inst. was received; and I read it with much pleasure; and satisfaction; I write at this time, to tell you, that Mr. A. Robinson was here last night, and he told me, that Mr. Nail, did on his way, from here. Bought the Claim of Capt. Achacha homma - from his heirs - when he talked to me, on this head, I take him, to have nothing to do with it - ^{him} I would never if he did, have those friendly; regard for him - But I see, he disregards, or has done so. Therefore please to do your endeavor to prevent, of Nail getting the weight of it, & of the other claim; in which I Bought, and sold it. It of this, I would thank you, to see the proper Department of it. Although I learn by your letter, that he has failed - But this being on a - mother ground, of his own - he may do something with it. I bought this land in good faith, and sell it as such - you know, it was no expectation on my part, - and if any except about it, you can use my name - to the proper authority A.C.C. Now I am going to file the deed, ~~the~~ with some things Great School is now wenting much, in the nation, this you got to judge the Dept. as far as it is weight to do so; with great respect - on every thing, it can be done, to forward the establishment, of the school, it should not be delayed - The views of the friends of the school in some few things are these, the most

you to be apointed to be at the head of it. I hope you
will git the appointment - and the will think part
of our people are very anxious to have our female
educated - as well as the male - And also I find many
of your friends - and in fact, I may say, of those
who is an enlightened, and know the practice of edu-
cation, and Civilized habits, - They are closely
and decidedly, the wish, the male & female may
have same advantages - And whenever our
School git's under way - At proper cause of
time - These will be; discover, and smart &
bright lads - It is soon helmed by experienced
those shant be affix to the post, for
the express purpose of sending of such to be
educated, in the State, - By so doing, the
Nation will soon be supplied with men
of learning - all this could, long, have
been done; But the Nation have made the
contrail of the money - their money be-
ing gone to support white men, in the
nation, and in Key - and made ^{them} rich, and
made us, in Charlestown, poor and gives no
learning.
