to, — The Quakers made a treaty with the Indians over 200 years since, in which the Quakers bound themselves & their children forever to be friends of the Indians, & the Indians bound themselves to be friendly to them, & this treaty had never been broken, the Indians had never taken any Quaker blood, & the Quakers had always been the true friends of the Indian, that was the reason why the government had sent the Quakers among them now, because our Grandfather at Washington knew that the Quakers were the firm friends of the Indians & would do right by them, & now he wanted them to listen to the advice the Quakers should give them for they would give only good council.

He said he had attended the great council at Okmulgee, in which fifteen Indian Nations were represented, & they wanted all the Indians of this Territory to be united & to become one people, & to have one common cause, the raiding of the young Kiowas & Comanches ~~was~~ ^{worked} against the progress, & to the injury of all Indians.
