Men, telling them to look, "just see what a mighty, powerful people the white folks are" "We are fools?" "I don't know anything" "We just like wolves running wild on the plains" & so the whole day was put in

6<sup>th</sup> 6<sup>th</sup> day Clear but Windy In Camp  
7<sup>th</sup> 7<sup>th</sup> day Clear Stereoscopic Exhibition, continue  
8<sup>th</sup> 1<sup>st</sup> day Clear In Camp  
9<sup>th</sup> 2<sup>nd</sup> day Clear In Camp

10<sup>th</sup> 3<sup>rd</sup> day Rainy In Camp Cold  
11<sup>th</sup> 4<sup>th</sup> day Clear A suspicious looking Mexican in camp to day, Unable to ascertain where he came from or what his business is

12<sup>th</sup> 5<sup>th</sup> day Clear & Pleasant Started for the Agency about 8.30 A.M. At noon Kicking Bird told me where we would camp at night, & as they usually put in 2, or 3 hours for a nooning, I drove on slowly, scarcely trotting all the afternoon, arrived at the place where Kicking Bird told me, stopped, unharnessed & took care of the mules, but the Kiowas took so long a nooning that they did not get along & I made up my mind to encamp by myself, but between Sundown & dark, Wild Horse a Comanche Chief came & camped by me, I would have preferred to have been alone, but still felt no uneasiness as to my personal safety, & gave a little opportunity for their exercise of their pilfering propensities, as the circumstances would permit

13<sup>th</sup> 6<sup>th</sup> Cloudy, Started early & got in to the Agency about 10, o'clock A.M., found two letters from home & one from brother Oliver Hampton, Wrote home to etc. Rained in the afternoon
