"While his report is interesting, & contains much information, it falls far short of telling of his own sacrifices, & deprivations in following the kind, or mode of living, of that nomadic race, whose custom is to change from place to place every few days. In the matter of teaching he has not accomplished a great deal with the children, but has, I think accomplished much among the older, especially those with whom he has come in immediate contact.

They promise as soon as their chiefs are returned to them, that they will give him their children again to teach. I think he has the foundation laid to do much good among them, as soon as they are relieved from the present state of suspense. "x x x"
