The following dispositions have been made to intercept northern Cheyennes one hundred mounted infantry leave here by special train tomorrow morning for Ft Wallace to head off Indians if they cross railroad east or west of that post. Two Companies infantry leave Hays this evening to take post at two noted crossing points of Indians on Kansas Pacific between Hays & Wallace one infantry Company from Dodge posted on Railroad west of that post Two Cavalry Companies from Reno are close on Indians and will be joined by the Cavalry Company from supply with order to follow up Indians Col Lewis will assume command of them as soon as they reach the vicinity of Dodge The troops at Lyon ordered to watch the country east & west of that post by Scouts & give at once when route of Indians is determined Scouts are now out from Dodge to give earliest information all ordered to attack Indians wherever found unless they surrender at once in which case they are to be disarmed and disarmed whatever precautions are possible should be taken on line of the platte.
