Monday night we were visited at anout 10 o'clock by a severe storm from the N. W. all but one tent was blown down and the ambulance overturned. No further damage, however. July lst arrived and went into camp on West side of walnut creek at 2 p.m., and july $2 n d$, reached a point on Pawnee Creek, two miles below Fort Larned. I had intended crossing this stream near its mouth but owing to the fact of the Arkansas being so high, the water in the Pawnee was backed up making it necessary to go up the stream 6 miles in order to effect a crossing. Two nours later the water in this stream had risen from 10 to 15 feet. July 3 rd , marched to Bigg Coon Creek over an excellent road and today the 4 th inst. reached this place at 11 o'clock a.m. I would respectfully state that the intensely hot weather experienced during the last ten days has made its ill effects apparent upon both men and animals of my command. Enclosed please ind "Note Book" containing necessary field notes and journal of the March.
