properly adjusted; the lock is not of sufficient strength and is liable to fail in exploding good ammunition. The rapid firing, the breech block is moved with difficulty and the ejector frequently fails to eject the shell. I earnestly recommend the Springfield carbine in performance to all others. The Colt's pistol metallic cartridge is entirely satisfactory. I believe it superior to all others in strength and accuracy of firing.

The leather covered saddles are the best I have seen in use in the service. They are without saddle pockets and should be supplied with them. The bridle bits now in use I consider outrageous. They are uniformly too heavy and are deficient in strength. It seems a pity to inflict a horse with them. I recommend the Daniel's steel bit with curt strap in place of curt chain.
